We've been combatting plastic pollution one disposable bottle at a time by installing water refill points throughout the area we serve.

With people topping up with tap water for free when out and about, our refill points have helped to prevent the need for more than 30,000 single-use plastic bottles.

Since we began our refill project in 2019, we have installed 17 refill points in towns and cities across the region and there are more to come.

Speaking about the refill project, Head of Community Engagement Kirsty Scarlett said: "I'm really pleased that our water refill points were used and supported so well by communities over the summer, and have started to make a real difference in reducing the number of single-use plastic bottles that head to landfill

"Less plastic is great for the planet and access to fresh drinking water is great for our local communities."

Four reasons to choose tap water over bottled water

Help to protect the environment by choosing tap water - here are some reasons to make the switch:

- Even though plastic bottles are recyclable, they don't all get recycled. A lot of them end up in landfill where they take 450 years to
- Producing a plastic bottle uses around three times more water than it holds, so by drinking tap water you will also be helping to save water.
- With tap water being approximately 500 times cheaper than bottled water, you could save a surprising amount of money by using a refillable bottle.
- 4 Bottled water takes around 2,000 times more energy to produce than tap water - reduce your carbon footprint by drinking tap water!

You may wonder why a penguin? The FVA penguin mascot was designed by one of our children and links to our Frome Vale Citizenship and every subject taught at FVA.




Sustainability and Climate Change Strategy

The Secretary of State announced a draft 'Sustainability and Climate Change Strategy' intended to help schools make a contribution to the work required to tackle climate change.

- A model science curriculum, in place by 2023, which will teach children about nature and their impact on the world.
- Encouragement for schools to increase biodiversity in their grounds.
- The establishment of a virtual 'National Education Park' - a virtual data platform that will allow pupils to track the climate change work they are undertaking and learn more about different species.
- A new Climate Leaders Award, with progression through 'bronze', 'silver' and 'gold' similar to Duke of Edinburgh Awards.
- Piloting of new net-zero 'energy pods' which might replace gas and coal boilers in schools.

Online Safety

What Parents Need to Know!

Each newsletter we will provide a helpful fact page on an online game or issue. We know children will want to play online games with their friends and this can be a great way for children to have fun. However as you will be aware

with every benefit there is also a disadvantage. Being aware of what these can be will help to keep your child safe. At National Online Safety, we believe in empowering parents, carers and trusted adults with the information to hold an informed conversation about online safety with their children, should they feel it is needed. This guide focuses on one issue of many which we believe trusted adults should be aware of. Please visit www.nationalonlinesafety.com for further guides, hints and tips for adults What Parents & Carers Need to Know about TikTok is a video-sharing social media app which lets people create, view and download looping 15-second clips. Typically, these are videos of users lip-syncing and dancing to popular songs or soundbites (often for comic purposes), enhanced with filters, effects and text. Designed with young people in mind, TikTok skyrocketed in popularity in 2019 and has featured near the top of download charts ever since. It now has around a billion users worldwide. AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT HAZARDOUS VISIBILITY Most videos appearing on a child's teed are light-hearted and amusing. However, some clips have been reported for featuring drug and alcohol abuse, themes of suicide and self-harm, or young teens acting in a sexually suggestive way. The sneer volume of uploads is impossible to moderate entirely and since TikTok Jump's introduction in mid-2021, users can view third-party content outside the app. Connecting with others is simple on TikTok including commenting on and reacting to users' videos, following their profile and downloading their content. The majority of these interactions are harmless, but – these interactions are harmless, but – because of its abundance of teen users TikTok has experienced problems with predators contacting young people. ADDICTIVE NATURE Like all social media platforms, TikTok can be extremely addictive. It can be hugely entertaining – but that also makes it hard to put down. As well as the punchy nature of the short video format, the app's ability to keep users intrigued about what's coming next means it's easy for a 5-minute visit to turn into a 45-minute stay. **EXPLICIT SONGS** TikTok primarily revolves around videos of users lip-syncing and dancing to music. Inevitably, some featured songs will contain explicit or suggestive lyrics. Given the app's young user-base, there is a risk that children may view older users' videos and then be inclined to imitate any explicit language or suggestive actions. IN-APP SPENDING + 1 There's an in-app option to purchase 'TikTok coins', which are then converted into digital rewards for sending to content creators that a user likes. Prices range from 99p to an eye-watering £99 bundle. TikTok is also connected with Shopify, which allows users to buy products through the app. TIKTOK FAME 60 The app has created its own celebrities: Charli D'Amello and Lil Nas X, for example, were catapulted to fame by exposure on TikTok – leading to many more teens attempting to go virul and become "TikTok famous". While most aspiring stars hoping to be 'the next big thing' will find it difficult, setbacks may in turn prompt them to go to even more drastic lengths to get noticed. Advice for Parents & Carers TALK ABOUT ONLINE CONTENT MAINTAIN PRIVACY SETTINGS LEARN ABOUT REPORTING Assuming your child is above TikTok's age limit, talk to them about what they've viewed on the app. Ask their opinion on what's appropriate and what Isn't. Explain why they shouldn't give out personal details or upload videos which reveal information like their school or home address. In the long run, teaching them to think critically about what they see on TikTok could help them to become social-media savvy. The default setting for all under 16s' accounts is 'private'. Keeping it that way is the safest solution: it means only users who your child approves can watch their videos. The 'Stitch' (which lets users splice clips from other people's videos into their own) and 'Duet' (where you build on another user's content by recording your own video alongside their original) features are now only available to over 16s. This might clash with your child's ambitions of social media stardom, but it will fortify their account against predators. AND BLOCKING With the correct privacy settings applied, TikTok is a relatively safe space. However, in case something does slip through, make sure your child knows how to recognise and report inappropriate content and get them to come to you about anything upsetting that they've seen. TikTok allows users to report anyone breaching its guidelines, while you can also black individual users through their profile. ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING USE RESTRICTED MODE MODERATE SCREEN TIME As entertaining as TikTok is, you can help your child to manage their time on it in the 'Digital Wellbeing' section. Under 'Screen Time Management', you can limit the daily permitted time on the app (in increments ranging from 40 minutes to two hours). This preference can also be locked behind a PIN. That way, your child can get their regular dose of TikTok without wasting the whole day. d In the app's 'Digital Wellbeling' section, you can filter out inappropriate content (specific content creaters or hashtags, for instance) using 'Restricted Mode'. This can then be locked with a PlN. You should note, though, that the algorithm moderating content isn't totally dependable – so it's wise to stay aware of what your child is watching. 'Family Pairing' lets parents and carers link their own TikTok account to their child's. Through your mobile, you can control your child's safety settings remotely – including limiting screen time, managing their ability to exchange messages (and with whom) and blocking a lot of age-inappropriate content. TikTok's Safety Centre also provides resources for parents and carers to support online safety among tamilies. These resources can be found on their website.
